Westward, Ho!: I made my usual January trip to Pasadena, CA to visit the AMA/IMS Convention 2000 in the hope that there would be some new items to review on the model boating scene.

Of the 120 vendors in attendance, only Dumas, Ships n' Things and Sub Tech could be considered primarily model boat suppliers. There were, of course, the usual displays of radios ... all the major brands sporting new (looking) inexpensive two to four channel surface radios in twin stick and pistol grip configuration. Airtronics has finally "gotten with the program", and affixed a new "Z" type connector to all new servos which will allow them to be used directly with Ace, JR, HiTec receivers and with slight modification to Futaba, as well. Ace/Thunder Tiger were showing the Nautical Commander, twin throttle radio, and promised availability by sometime in March. The literature on that unit shows several interesting arrangements, including dual rate rudder, an additional 270° knob, and a 3 position latched or spring centered switch. I was assured that the transmitter will have servo reversing switches. (The units purchased by club members late last year did

not. They required unplugging, reversing and replugging electrical connectors...certainly, not the most inventive idea in the world. It is quite difficult to ascertain if the plug is "normal" or "reversed").

The Maritime Modelers Club of Los Angeles, had a display this year after being absent in '99. Several of their boats were quite nice. They operated at least one or two boats continuously on a one foot deep indoor, plastic lined, "pond" which appears to be about 25 x 35 feet in size.

A final note on Ships 'n Things. This was Al Matava's first visit to the California show. He confessed that he "didn't know what to bring". But he did have a fittings display that would make any Minnesota modeler drool. Universals, propellers, chain, searchlights, stanchions, running lights, flags, etc., etc. He even showed three different styles of toothed belt drives. Boy! I wish that there were a local source that had even some of those items available. Al mentioned that he had made application to display at the Toledo show in April. So, look for him there.

**Thinned Epoxy:** According to *Epoxyworks*, the free newsletter from Gougeon Brothers, the makers of West System® epoxy, using solvents to reduce the viscosity of epoxy is usually a poor idea. Since we generally thin epoxy to get deeper penetration for purposes of waterproofing hulls, for example, it is interesting to see what they have to say in that regard. "Water resistance of a piece of wood is not enhanced by deep penetration....an epoxy coating on the surface is more water-resistant than a thinned epoxy coating that has penetrated deeply into the wood because, in most instances, the epoxy thinned with solvent is *porous*" (emphasis, mine Ed).

If you must thin epoxy, Gougeon suggests fast evaporating lacquer thinner in preference to either acetone or denatured alcohol. They also suggest the addition of no more than 5% solvent. While the addition of 5% thinner reduces the viscosity by 60%, it also reduces epoxy's compressive strength by 35%, making it an unreliable adhesive.

To reduce the viscosity of epoxy, without the previously mentioned negative results, Gougeon recommends heat. Of course, heat causes epoxy to set up rapidly.....sometimes, too rapidly. But, the manufacturer states, you don't have to heat the epoxy. Warm the wood instead. As room-temperature epoxy comes in contact with the warm wood, it is heated slightly, and thinned. As the wood cools, the now warmed epoxy is drawn into the wood more deeply than normal by the contracting air in the wood's pores. Heating epoxy from 70° to 90°, decreases its viscosity by more than half.

Heating the wood sounds like a pretty slick idea! Why didn't I think of that! Jim **Sawdust:** On of my favorite tools is a 5" disc sander built for me by a friend several years ago.

I noticed a similar machine advertised in an obscure modeler's journal. It might be worth a look.

"The best sander you can buy! \$110, +\$5 UPS"

**Storage:** Be aware that the plasticizer in PVC may cause rubber to deteriorate. Polyethylene and Polypropylene will not. So, avoid PVC containers for storage of anything containing rubber parts.

How can you tell? PVC is heavier than water, while both polyethylene and polypropylene float in water.

The models depict the development of Great Lakes watercraft over a four century period.
