Membership Meeting, 6/20/00: Commodore called meeting to order at 7:00PM. 36 members and guests in attendance. Commodore handed out Parade door prizes to those winners present. Review of Parade: New "snow" fence at skipper's area worked very well. Several spectators expressed desire that more boats be on the water at all times. It appears that the half-hour change over period results in very few boats on the pond on the hour and half-hour. Several members commented on the unusual amount of radio interference. This was probably the result of "packing" so many transmitters in a confined space. We may attempt to operate some boats from the middle or south end of the pond in the future. We definitely need

Hits: In regard to the radio interference experienced at the Parade, and reported in the minutes above, I referred to the Academy of Model Aeronautics (AMA) Membership Manual. As you may be aware, the AMA is the agency responsible for the fact that we surface operators (cars, boats) have 30 channels reserved for our use on 75mHz.

When narrow band receivers are used, the AMA recommends that "all flight operations are encouraged to keep operating transmitters 10 to 20 feet apart". The same recommended separation applies to our "surface" radios, even disregarding the fact that many of us use older, wide band receivers.

In the "real" world, we boaters are too congenial to space ourselves "10 to 20 feet apart" during normal open boating operations...and the Parade crowding situation made the spacing advice almost impossible to adhere to in any event. So, until tighter radios come along, it appears that the radio interference "hits" that we experience will continue...as the result of our own poor radio usage.

Ace?: I received a mailing dated June 13th that stated, "Unfortunately, unavoidable circumstances force us to close all Sky Hobby operations effective June 23rd, 2000". Since Ace had been affiliated with Sky Hobbies, I called Ace to check on the future availability of the Nautical Commander radio. It is, and will continue to be available through your local dealer, or directly from Ace.

Sail Race(s): The U.S. One Meter, Region 4 Championship will be held over the weekend of July 29th and 30th at DeWeese Park in Dayton, OH. A Star-45 RCCR will be held concurrently. Entries must be received by July 26th. Contact: Donald Peacock.

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Following is a list of the Media coverage that the club received regarding the Parade. In addition, some stations broadcast taped segments of last year's event which are not shown below.

Perk-olator: The channel 11, "Perk at Play" TV shoot on June 6^{th} came off without a hitch. Even though the aired piece was more about "Perk" than about the club, John Bishop did manage to get in a quick mention of the Parade of Boats. 35 members took the time and made the effort to attend. We extend special thanks to the parents of our younger members for allowing them to attend.

The planned, "Little Eddie Fitzgerald" piece, notwithstanding, events demonstrated emphatically that "fast electrics" are much too dangerous to share the same water with "sail" and "scale".

As a result of the TV show, we received a call from representative of the Eden Prairie newspaper. They intend to cover the Parade, after the fact.

Morning Show: Channel 9's "Good Day Minnesota" shoot on June 8th was well attended too, considering the time of day (7AM !!). 16 members brought 1 (big!) ship, plus about 25 boats (and a frog and a duck) for the "live" broadcast. Club activities were broadcast six times during the two hour show for a total air time of about 17 minutes. Stephan Reynolds made a point to mention the Parade of Boats during each segment.

Once again, the "fast electric"-"slow boat" mix almost ended in disaster as Chad Splettstoeszer's mini tug was swamped by a suddenly, not so disabled speedboat, as he prepared to push it toward shore. Chad managed to get his boat within inches of his outstretched hand before it sank!

Our web site received over 400 "hits" within hours of the TV broadcast and our Commodore was inundated by telephone calls after the show. He'd be quite happy if someone else would kindly volunteer to field the calls, next year!

Sun: The Edina Sun Current newspaper carried preview of the Parade on page 1 of their June 7th edition along with a photograph and half page spread inside on page 3. The same article appeared on that newspaper's web page.

Strib: The Minneapolis Star/Tribune had an announcement of the Parade in the Friday, June 9th edition, in the *Free Time* section. A much larger, 15 column-inch article with photograph appeared in the *Arts & Entertainment* section on Sunday, 6/11.

Other: Two TV stations had cameras at the Parade, while at least one station aired stock footage from last year. I know that's true, since I received a wise remark from a friend regarding my "cool" hat. I wore the hat during last year's taping...but not this time!

Checkmate: M.J.Milano makes some very nice custom (bank) checks. Styles depicting submarines are available, as are checks displaying your model's picture or your picture, for that matter. The first 100 checks cost about \$ 9, which covers the setup charge. Subsequent and larger orders are a bit less spendy.

Being There: Corinne and I have been discussing a cruise on the Queen Elizabeth 2 (QE-2) for quite some time. We finally managed a four-day "Cruise to Nowhere" in the vicinity of New York harbor over the long July 4th weekend.

The trip combined the excellent service offered on a British liner with a front row seat for the arrival of the tall ships in New York harbor during OpSail 2000, and a great holiday fireworks display.

The tall ships were most impressive. It is amazing that so many nations, states, and even individual owners expend the time and resources to keep these ships operational. The U.S.C.G. barque "Eagle" lead the parade of over 50 tall ships past about three dozen warships from 25 nations, anchored in the harbor, Hundreds of additional vessels of all kinds joined in or just observed the fun. It was billed as "the largest gathering of seafaring vessels in maritime history" Of course, the Gen-Xer who dreamed up that line of copy must have been napping when "Dunkerque" and "D-Day" were covered in high school history class.

Although the Parade was scheduled to proceed from the Narrows to the George Washington Bridge and then to reverse course, only six vessels did so. The remainder turned at about 50th street, resulting in much disappointment amongst those viewers who had stationed themselves north of that point.

Our ship was anchored just off Brooklyn Heights, a mile or so north of the Verrazano Narrows Bridge. Several large fireworks barges were anchored in the vicinity of that bridge, which gave us an "up close and personal" view of that venue. Additional barges were on the Hudson at about 50th Street, while an another half dozen or more were spaced out along the East river, north of the South Seaport Museum.

The fireworks were quite spectacular, being advertised as the largest ever, fireworks display in America!. 150 tons of explosives were distributed among 60,000 shells. There was an average of 2,000 shells per minute for a full 30 minutes of show time. Perhaps you saw the show on NBC-TV. Well! Let me tell ya! You just had to be there to get the full effect. The "rocket's red glare, the bombs bursting in air" over fort McHenry was tame by comparison.

My ears are still ringing!
