RC LASER RENTAL FLEET

During the summer of 2003 a new rental fleet of RC Laser sailboats was introduced to the Center Pond of Centennial Lakes.

The Coppage family put together a plan to keep college student Dawn, boy friend Abe and high school student Dave employed. The plan was simple: Buy four RC Lasers, build a cart to carry and display the boats and work Centennial with Lakes Park Manager Tom Shirley to provide Centennial Lakes Park patrons

a new way to experience the park and try RC sailing.

Dawn and the team started just after Memorial Day. Each day Dawn would open her stand late in the afternoon, and rentals would be available until sunset. These kids rented boats to park patrons for twelve weeks. All of the kids participating in this rental business really had a great learning experience. Rental rates were \$10 per _-hour, and during a typical afternoon 2 to 4 rentals would be out on the pond. The final tally is not yet complete, but it looks like in the first season enough rental business was generated to pay each person running the rentals roughly \$8 per hour daily.

The rental RC Lasers performed very well during the summer. Only two servos and one rudder were replaced during the entire program. With the Edina Model Yacht Club setting aside four channels for the rental fleet, we managed to avoid most channel clashing issues.

Plans are underway for the 2004 rental season, and we would like to have your feed back on this rental program. Please contact Bill Coppage with your comments.

FAST ELECTRIC NEWS

The 2003 season of fast electric racing was a good one. Most every Thursday evening last summer at the south pond saw the water churned up with the excitement of 3 spec race classes.

2004 promises to be even better. Doug Campbell's new plastic molded shovel nose hydro is becoming a class favorite for what we call Limited Spec Hydro (LSH). This class basically consists of any sport hydro plane hull with a spec'd 700 motor and 12 cells. Everything else is up to the builder. Doug and I have been experimenting with different hull properties for the last 5 years. Over that time Doug has built me some of the fastest hulls in the nation. I've competed in races in Florida, Illinois, Wisconsin and most recently Arizona. Doug's hulls keep proving that there is nothing out there that can run with them.

In addition to the LSH class the fast electric group will continue to run the Limited Spec Offshore class - 12 cells, 700 spec'd motor and any mono hull over 26" in length. This class is an excellent entry into Fast Electric world since it provides a stable hull, good speed and probably the most affordable setup around. For 2003 we had approximately 8 or 9 members that had boats in this class.

The third spec class that we run is called Limited Spec Mono. This class is comprised of any mono hull, a Trinity Chameleon motor and 6 cells. The rest is left to the builder. Again a very affordable class with respectable speeds.

Lastly the Fast Electric fleet of open boats continues to

grow. Unlike a spec class, an open class simply limits the number of cells a boat can use - the rest is at the discretion of the builder. For 2003, Mark Anderson built and ran the fastest P Sport Hydro (12 cells) that I've ever seen. I'm confident that Mark's boat is the fastest of it's type in the country. He was seeing speeds around the 60 mph mark. For 2004 though Mark will have some competition from me and my new Doug Campbell built hyrdoplane. It's built using depron foam, carbon fiber, kevlar and e-glass.

One other notworthy event happened in the end of 2003 out in California. A 32 cell hydro captured the world record for an R/C boat at a 2 way average speed of 120.7 mph! This eclipsed the previous title held by a twin .90 powered rigger at 120.2 mph!

MEETING NOTES

Jan. 20, 2004.

Commodore, Paul Olsen called the meeting to order at 7:05 PM

Paul thanked Dale Johnson for the fine job on the club's newsletter.

Paul asked for input from the members. "What do you expect from the club?" "What can be done to improve the organization?"

Tim Smalley commented on the Sunday evening sailing at Edinborough indoor pool. He suggested that scale boaters acquire the pool after the sailors and operate from 7:30 to 8:30 or 9:00PM. Cost is \$25 per hour. A show of hands indicated at least eight members who were interested.

Alex Raupp suggested reforming committees such as Sail, Scale, Membership, Parade of Boats, etc.

Bob Larson asked, "What happened to the attendance at the center pond boating last year?" It was felt that the sailing group gathering on the north pond and the fast electric group on the south had adversely affected the numbers at the central pond... to some extent. in the boating area when the club is operating.

Dave Bros suggested that radio frequencies should be addressed in the rules.

Neil Maldeis stated that the feeding of the ducks in the boating area certainly contributed to the algae "bloom" that is so prevalent. Paul stated that he felt it was up to park personnel to handle the "feeding" problem. Perhaps a larger sign, placed more strategically would help.

A question was asked if it could be made clear to paddle boaters that the club's bouys were to be avoided, not run over. Paul said that he'd check that out with the park director to see if something could be posted at the paddle boat rental area.

Paul stated that the ponds were to be drained and cleaned early in the year. It is hoped that it can be accomplished and the ponds refilled before the end of April.

A member questioned the suitability of members mass ordering the One-Design One Meter sailboats "secretly." Larry Wheeler responded that there was no attempt at secrecy. It was just an agreement among north pond sailors to upgrade their fleet for 2004. The bulk purchase saved no money on the boats, just on shipping. The commodore reiterated that we are all one club and that the board of directors should be informed as to "what's going on!" Mentioning the purchase before hand in the newsletter would have been a good idea... in the event that other members might have been interested.

Neil Maldeis suggested using the vice-commodores to coordinate events of the various groups. He felt that the board members (vice-commodores) were left out of the planning last year.

Gary Anderson asked for a run down on what the club owns. Paul listed two retrieval boats, electric outboard motor, battery, charger, frequency meter, club burgee and banner and several coolers.

Mike Ross stated that we could set up a semi permanent steering course in the vicinity of the band shell since the paddle boaters rarely went that far south. Several members voiced the opinion that a course in that area would further divide the club's operation.

the rental boats. He asked for recommendations as to what type of electric boats to add to the fleet. Several members wondered aloud about the loss of additional radio frequencies. It was suggested that perhaps the rental boats could be operat-

Tom Weigel announce that he has placed an order for additional, small club burgees (\$20), since the first group sold out almost immediately. They should be available at the February meeting.

Paul asked for help in updating the club web site.

He felt that it is too heavily weighted toward fast electric operation.

Dale Johnson asked any members who had mailed in their club renewals to pick up their membership cards.

YOUNG PRESENTS OPEN CARVING CLASS

Richard Young, noted shipmodeler and woodcarver, is presenting an open carving class related to ship ornamentation 17-22 May at his Manitowoc studio, 1124 S. 10th Street. If you've always wanted to learn how to carve but didn't know where to start, or if you have started and could use a little guidance, now is the time to enroll. Bring any scale figurehead, stern decoration, friezework, or gunport wreath. Whether it's for a model or your full-size boat, you can carve it.

Students may carve three, four, five, or six days at \$75 per day, 09:00 to 17:00 with an hour for lunch (not included). In addition, they may carve Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday when the Manitowoc Carving Club meets from 18:30 to 20:30. Those carving decoration for their models must bring Dockyard's 1.5mm micro carving set (Woodcraft #17K41, www.woodcraft.com stock <http://www.woodcraft.com>) and headband magnifier or prescription magnifying glasses. Do not bring any type of magnifier that sits on or mounts to the bench. Those wishing to start a new project will carve in applewood (supplied). Boxwood lovers must bring their own. Young will provide all tools required for larger carving projects.

Please call Young Monday through Friday from 09:00 to 17:00 CST to discuss your specific project and schedule a class time. Enrollment is limited due to space, so don't drag your anchor. A \$100 deposit, refundable through 30 April, reserves a carving bench and stool.
