South Pond Open Sailing

The first Sunday of open sailing for beginners and everyone else at the South Pond was a huge success! It was difficult to both sail and at the same time count all the other boats that were on the water, but I think there was close to 15 sailboats at one time plus a couple of power boats too. We had four buoys set out and people were practicing sail settings by sailing ovals and figure 8's around the closest buoys and some sailed out to the farther two to practice rounding the end buoys when racing. Still a couple were practicing hitting the starting line just right with the countdown to start box. Many asked when the next session would be!



That is Ryan Butler and his fleet of four small craft. The catamarans were predictably prone to tip over, but the small sailboat was surprisingly functional and the small fishing boat ran very sweet. Later Ryan tried out a DF 95 and found out how much easier to sail and control it was over the small boat.

With the 4th of July here already we will hopefully have open sailing for those still in town on Sunday the 3rd, and back up to open sailing to especially help new sailors and/or provide an introduction to sailing for new persons the following Sunday the 10th when Bill Coppage will be able to attend and help anyone out.

We have talked about having a special day for the Fairwinds so let's set <u>July 24th</u> as <u>Fairwind Sunday</u>, on the south pond from noon to 3:00. Dust them off, slip in a newly charged battery and bring that old Fairwind down to the pond to celebrate the boat that really began it all for RC clubs all over the country.

Definitely a Texas boy, Patrick approached us at the parade and was looking to join the club and find a home for his amazing pusher boat. We are happy to provide a home for his boat as it is quite difficult to store in his apartment. Along with Jeff McCabe's two light houses the cage storage area is suddenly much more interesting:





What an incredible history this boat has. Built in 2014 as a training boat for training boat captains in the Washington state area. The boat operates as does the real boat. Reportedly a \$10,500 build the boat originally included a large barge that a person could actually sit in and operate the boat. Patrick rescued the boat and due to the size and his living circumstances would actually like to find a home for the boat at a reasonable sale price. He has had offers from some major entities to donate the boat to them but that is not necessarily the situation for long term preservation, use of the boat and maintaining its condition Patrick is looking for. Last it was shipped from Canada where Patrick was living, and Patrick is possibly moving back to Texas in about a year so we will have limited time with this wonderful boat. The radio is very interesting as it looks very similar to what we are all using, twin sticks, but each stick is actually two sticks, each split into a left and a right half. Patrick has traveled around quite a bit and always interested in RC boating he was amazed at the Parade show, the types and numbers of boats on display, and the venue. He stated at the meeting that we probably don't realize how special the club is and how rare it is in light of anything similar anywhere else in the world. Whew! That is a big statement and points out that our club is perhaps much more special than we already think it is.

Paul Veronikas

Paul brings another amazing boat to the club. A covid project, Paul didn't shrink at the shear complexity of the task in building the Battleship Bismarck. This is not only an epic build, but has an epic story to go with it.





The kit itself is 1/98th scale and comes in at about 40 pounds. Another 12 - 15 pounds were added to help it sit in the water better. The kit itself has taken around 500 hours to date including installation of 3 motors and somewhere around 45 feet of wiring. The wiring was a learn-as-you-go project and included two fires that caused portions of the boat to be destroyed and reconstructed! Yikes!!! A testament to Paul's patience and perseverance for certain! Paul adds that the model kit itself was not that expensive, and maybe even cheap compared to the additional \$1,700 in electronics - so far. The lighting was quite spectacular and will have quite a presence at Light House Night. The boat is still a work in progress and Paul has plans to add servos to the turrets and a smoke generator. Paul was remarkably calm and matter of fact when telling his story at the meeting. All were suitably impressed.

Also in attendance was new member Randy Liebo. I somehow missed getting Randy's photo so I will have more on Randy in the next newsletter.

Other happenings

Rob Segal has made a very nice offer to the club. At the next meeting Rob will do a demonstration of his vinyl cutting machine, by providing lettering for anyone in the club. Here is Rob's offer:

During the July 19th meeting I will have my vinyl cutter set up in the band room and can cut vinyl lettering or stencils for boat names, registration #s, sail #s, or any other application you may have for lettering or stenciling.

In order for me to get as much done as possible for everyone, please get your artwork ready ahead of time and email it to me as soon as you can.

File types that can be used are: PNG, DXF, JPEG (JPG), BMP, GIF, TIFF, or PDF. Black lettering on white background, please. Accompany the file with a note verifying dimensions (both height and width, in inches) and font used. If you are unable to produce a file in any of these formats, I can produce what is needed from a simple sketch if you can specify font and dimensions. I can easily adjust to fit desired dimensions as well, for instance if you wish your lettering were a bit taller without getting wider to fit your transom better, just mention that in your notes regarding dimensions. Want a Chris Craft or other logo? If you can find a decent image on the web, just send that along with dimensions.

Vinyl lettering, or stencil? I need to know if you want vinyl lettering to apply directly to your boat, or a low tack adhesive stencil to use to paint your lettering. Lettering is easy to apply, but painted stencil lettering is thinner and isn't limited to available vinyl colors.

I will have stencil material with me, along with a few basic vinyl colors: White, Black, some "chrome" silver, and some "gold leaf". If you want lettering in other colors, 12"x12" pieces of Oracal 651 vinyl can be purchased at Michaels for under \$2/sheet. (see attached photo) Just purchase the color you like and bring it to the meeting. I'll also have transfer paper and tools for "weeding" the vinyl once cut.

Feel free to email me with questions- more than likely we can do whatever you can dream up as long as there is enough lead time to set up the files!

White Bear Lake Classic and Vintage Boat Show

The White Bear Lake show started out like several of the shows have, anticipating rain. And it looked like it was going to rain in the morning but did not end up that way at all. Very pleasant warm day with an overcast sky so you did not need to seek shade or worry about sun burn. As always there were lots of new and interesting boats, some from previous shows and one very large boat that had been previously displayed for restoration and now completed. The nice thing about this particular show is that all the boats, except for one this year, are on land so you can stand right next to them, touch them and peer inside. Here is the club display at the show:



Lots and lots of visitors, makes the day go by quickly. The show is best shown in a slide presentation which we will save for a future meeting, but here is a preview:



This boat should seem familiar to you. After this photo was taken they displayed a model of the boat on the bow. There was one more at the show too:



That is correct, it is Richard Dahlquist's spectacular boat that is always displayed in the foyer of the pavilion at the Parade of Boats. You can't see it in the photo of the club setup but it is behind the people looking at it just left of the white tent/awning. The real boat was spectacularly finished similar to the models.



This is the boat that was displayed at previous shows prior to restoration, but is now completed. Built by Johnson Boat Works in White Bear Lake it is a 38 foot motor launch. It eventually ended up in St. Petersburg Florida, recently returned to White Bear Lake for the restoration.

The engine was worthy of display on its own:



The boat was absolutely stunning!

When talking to many of the boat owners it was interesting that most were also going to have their boat at the upcoming Alexandria show and the Lake Minnetonka show this fall, so we will be seeing some of these boats again, this time on the water.
