of the club and the members. For clubs everywhere, members do not come any better than these two guys!






The Most Dedicated Sailors?






Recently the club received a donation of the Mount Washington boat that was reported on in the September newsletter. There have been several people interested in this model of a very unique boat with a walking beam paddle wheel drive system. The boat is very much intact and contains all the pieces needed to make a fully functioning

boat, however the drive system is missing a pulley on the motor to drive the shaft that turns the paddle wheels, and as we all know, minor damage has occurred to parts of the model accessories and features. The boat is still up for sale as-is, or it would be much more sellable with the drive system completed and minor repairs affected. Again as included in a previous newsletter David Geovaninni has an EC 12 up for sale. There also was an EC 12 for sale locally that was purchased by one of the sail boat racers. That makes three EC 12's in the club and bringing another one into the group would make four, and that is a nice little regatta. So I solicited more information from David and more photos too:







More from David: "I purchased the EC12 about 6-7 years ago from a listing on AMYA. It was owned by a gentleman in Canada. It was registered as 2205 in Canada and I was able to transfer the registration to AMYA. I have sailed it on the local pond half dozen times since I bought it. It has a functioning drum winch. New A rig sails, mast and booms along with a set of B rig sails. Both sets of sails are mounted on their own mast and booms. Also have the transmitter, receiver and batteries for the boat. I repainted the hull about 3 years ago and it has only been on the water with new paint 1-2 times. I changed out most of the hardware to brass so if someone wants to compete with it they might want to change out fittings. I recently purchased a launcher/carrier that also would go with it. Has the newer square rudder. I also still have some paint that I would be happy to give anyone interested for future touch ups along with a few spare parts. Seems to have decent speed but needs an owner who will work on setting up properly" David is looking for \$1,100 for the complete boat and equipment. He lives in

Aberdeen South Dakota but I am sure you can work out something with David for delivery. Let me know if you are interested and I will put you in touch.
