Belinda Jensen did the same on 6/4. Then, there was a notice and photograph on page one of the Variety section in the Star Tribune on 6/11 and a note in the Pioneer Press on the same day. Following that, a taped piece on Channel 11's KARE News on the evening of 6/11 and a second taped piece, this time with Channel 11's Belinda Jensen on the News Saturday show of 6/12.

Our thanks go to Tom Shirley, Barb Buie, and the City of Edina who have all been instrumental in providing us with the facilities and equipment to display and run our boats. I sent a thank you letter to them a few days after the show. I travel all over the country and occasionally see where other clubs operate; believe me when I say that we have one of the finest areas in which to operate our boats.

We had the best turnout from the membership of any event ever held and the highest number of model boats (140+) on display since the first Parade show in 1992; the club membership as a whole, is responsible for this success.

I've been keeping track of comments, good and bad, in hope of creating better shows in the future. For long term planning purposes the Parade is already booked for Sunday, June 11th, 2000. Thanks, John Bishop

Membership Meeting, 5/18/99: 29 members and guests in attendance. Commodore called meeting to order at 7:10PM. Commodore commended J.Bishop for a job well done on the Parade. He also commented on how much media coverage we had as a result of the efforts of T.Smalley. Group applauded. Request was made for ideas on improving next year's show. Discussion was rapid-fire, making it difficult to identify each speaker. Ideas and comments follow: Need more brochures, many more schedules. Several guests indicated a desire for club newsletters. Restrict infant strollers. Print schedule(timetable) earlier so members can volunteer their time so as not to conflict with the time period in which they want to run their boats. Print poster sized schedules for the wall in Centrum and for display at the frequency tent. Get a list of volunteers before the morning of the event. Hire a police person for launch area. Family members not allowed in skipper's area. Have Edina bicycle police patrol in area during day. Have MacDonald's or Subway deliver sandwiches during event. Attach cantilevered bars and ribbons to tables to prevent touching boats. flow control..one way traffic within Centrum. Make announcements on PA inside Centrum. Don't have announcements in Centrum. Make sure that P.A. is hooked up to park audio system so that announcer can be heard beyond the Centrum area. Make sure that spectators are aware that there are boats on display inside the Centrum.

A.Raupp made mention of sail regatta on 6/19&20. Attempt will be made to have the fountain turned off on the afternoons of the event. K.Brust spoke on the big EEEEasy. Will lay out obstacle course, etc.

All electric boat owners are encouraged to attend. Possibility of changing date from 7/11 to 7/7 to hold the gathering during the TV shoot by Ch 5's Joe Schmit between 5:45 and 6:30PM. Will call all members with exact time and date change.

G.Pfeifer stated that the Classic Boat Show at Treasure Island wil have two 10x20 foot tents for our use. River City Days in Red Wing will occur simultaneously with the boat show. Treasure Island rooms are still available, call George. Club will put maps in newsletter. Please help out. We want a good showing on both days

J.Smith handed out door prizes from Parade. Ron Bongard, "I never win anything", took home the Midwest launch and steam engine which was donated by Tony Seuss of Modelers Boatyard. Tim Smalley took home the R/C female (you saw the hat) duck which had been donated by charter member, Glenn Anderson at the show.

Show-'n-Tell: J.Smith displayed the print of the Edna G. which he had mentioned in the newsletter. He also had two Microglass tug hulls, one of which is "under construction". D.Campbell showed his Graupner outboard powered 1/6 scale hydro with G.I.Joe aboard. He also showed a Viper R kit which is the official entry level club fast electric racer at about \$90. D.Johnson showed his Century Sea Maid which is under construction. Dale also showed several fittings sets which he has cast from original kit parts. Somehow, in this effort, the copies are (much) better than the originals. He also displayed some of the computer aided and/or generated drawings of bulkheads and other kit parts taken from and improved upon from original kits which he has found ...and continues to seek. Boat Show: The Whitefish Chain of Lakes will host a 12th Annual Wooden Boat Rendezvous at the Moonlight Bay Restaurant in Crosslake on Saturday, July 24th. Lots of mahogany prototypes to look over!

Resident Artist: Along with all of the other talented people who have joined the club of late, Ray Johnson, artiste, cartoonist... extrordinaire, has forked over his twenty bucks. This issue sports the first two, of what I hope to be many, of Ray's works.



Running Procedures: As the weather improves outside we can expect more club members showing up and participating in open boating on Tuesday, Thursday, and Sunday evenings. As a reminder, before operating or testing any of your equipment make sure that your frequency is clear. This can be done by checking the frequency clip panel often in use or (if frequency clips not available) by checking with those current running boats on the water. Club members should have the correct numbers and/or flags displayed on their antenna masts denoting the channel in use. If they don't, i.e. general public running on their own, it's important to let them know that they must follow our rules when they run with us. This can be done tactfully without creating any hard feelings.

Once you're ready to run here is the proper way to operate your radio equipment:

•neutralize the controls, that is, ensure control sticks are set so that when power is applied motors don't run and servo controls are not moved to their limits.

•turn on the transmitter •turn on the receiver When finished running the boat: •turn off the receiver •turn off the transmitter

This procedure is simple and straight forward. It ensures that your transmitter will operate your equipment. I have seen a few people trying to figure out why they have electrical problems when there is really no problem at all. Servos will twitch, vibrate, and shake about if the receiver is turned on before the transmitter. This occurs because the receiver is looking for a commanding signal from the transmitter. and when the transmitter is turned off the receiver is receiving a variety of stray information from other sources. Following the procedure listed above will eliminate some potential electrical problems. Remember that low battery power to the transmitter and receiver can cause similar problems as well. Having a full charge for both sources will further eliminate electrical problems. John Bishop

Radio: While we're on the subject, let's be aware of radio malfunctions, glitches and interference. Our equipment is far from fail-safe (read: fool-proof)! If you operate in a care-free (read: careless) manner, it is only a matter of time before another boat is damaged or, worse yet, a spectator is injured. Frightening spectators is not what we are at the pond to do! Operate your equipment responsibly and we will not find ourselves involved in a lawsuit. Let's all be careful out there!

Lucky: We exchange newsletters with the Shelton Scale Ship Modelers Club, located about 15 miles northwest of Olympia, WA. They operate on a portable pond that appears to be about 30x30x1.5feet in depth. When they put on displays, they try to get a local fire department to "fil-'er-up". After the event, they drain it by using a submersible pump. Boy! Are we lucky here in the land of 10,000 lakes. But then, of course,...we do have winter!

Finis!?: The Big EEEEasy, originally scheduled for July 11th, was rescheduled to be perhaps our last media driven gathering of the season. About three dozen members appeared for KSTP-TV's, Joe Schmit show on Wednesday, July 7th. Twenty-two boats were on the water simultaneously as our illustrious Commodore was interviewed "live" for Joe's "Out and About" segment on the 6 o'clock news. Several spectators arrived at the pond shortly after having seen the show…so it appears that we are being watched.

Mercer Way, Mercer Island, WA 98040 **Chinese Anyone?:** An article by Nicholas Kristof in the Sunday, June 6th issue of *The New York Times Magazine* (available at your local library) gives some food for thought.

Decades before Columbus, Chinese Admiral Zheng He (pronounced Jung Huh) sailed from China to conquer the world. His fleet consisted of 300 ships and 28,000 men! Not until the first world war did western nations muster such an armada.

Several of Zheng's ships were as long as 400 feet, with a beam of 160 and sported nine masts, balanced rudders and watertight compartments; features which did not appear on European vessels for another 350 years. The fleet even included 20 fresh water tankers.

Zheng's fleet is known to have reached the eastern coast of Africa, where he learned of the Europeans from Arab traders. He considered Europeans rather backward and would not consider trading with them. Africa was much more to his liking.

Shortly after Zheng's return to China, a new regime took over and halted construction of new ships, destroyed Zheng's sailing records, and set about destroying China's navy as well.

Perhaps, but for those politicians' disastrous actions, we here in the good ol' U.S. of A. might be speaking Chinese.

Note: Columbus, more than fifty years later, traveled in three, 85 foot ships with only 90 sailors.

Collectibles: Did you know that, to some extent as a result of the recent movie, postcards depicting the White Star Lines' *RMS Titanic* have escalated in value to between \$300 and \$500 apiece. If the card was actually posted from the ship, however, the value increases ten fold, into the realm of \$3000 to \$5000 for one, 1 penny postcard!

On land, wind felt on face speed 4-6 knots
Force 3: "gentle breeze" large wavelets, crests begin to break
On land, leaves in constant motion speed 7-10 knots
Force 4: "moderate breeze" small waves become longer
On land, raises dust, loose paper speed 11-16 knots
Force 5: "fresh breeze" moderate waves, some spray
On land, small trees sway speed 17-21 knots

Force 6 through 12: head for the Dairy Queen!
